Castleford to Wakefield Greenway

Official Launch of New Path

The much-anticipated official opening of the latest addition to the Castleford to Wakefield Greenway took place on the 13th March. Over 20 Cycle Forum members assembled at the Whitwood Golf Club, which sits adjacent to the new path, along with officials and councillors from Leeds and Wakefield Councils.



Thankfully the weather was kind with no sign of the wintery conditions we had been suffering up until then. The original launch was a victim of the weather and had been cancelled. As our group of happy cyclists approached the ribbon was cut by Councillor Peter Box, leader of Wakefield Council.



The opening of the new path was featured on the evening news bulletin on Radio Leeds. Our Chair, Sandy Clark, was interviewed for the programme. He pointed out that Wakefield District Cycle Forum had been campaigning for this stretch of path for around 20 years, but that the wait

had been worth it. 'This is the first time in almost 20 years of campaigning on behalf of cyclists in Wakefield that I can say I find nothing to criticise about a piece cycle infrastructure' stated Sandy.

After the launch of the new path we were treated by City Connect, the Joint West Yorkshire Authorities group responsible for the project, to a drink and butty in the Clubhouse. As you can see this was most appreciated.

The path has already proved popular with all groups of users. Over a period of an hour one Monday morning there were 8 cyclists, 12 walkers, 4 dogs, a baby buggy and a jogger.





The path will now enhance the routes available for our guided rides from Castleford's Queens Mill. This is already one of our most popular rides and is likely to be an even more popular venue now that riders can enjoy the beauty of the River Calder free of traffic.

Inaugural Ride

Not contented to wait for the official launch of the new Methley Bridge to Fairies Hill section of the Castleford to Wakefield Greenway, the Cycle Forum decided to have its own 'unofficial' opening with a ride along the new path. The official opening had been postponed for a couple of weeks due to bad weather.



After a cup of tea from the café at the Mill it was down to the river and along the amazing new path. When the participants arrived at Whitwood Golf Club butties were ordered and drinks were drunk.

Over twenty joined our easy ride from Queens Mill in Castleford, where our Vice-Chair David Leigh, the man with the most interesting rides in our programme, claimed a first again by leading the inaugural ride on the new path.

Repairs and Completion

The new section of cycle path from Methley Bridge to Fairies Hill does not unfortunately complete the whole of the Castleford to Wakefield Greenway.

One section at the beginning in Castleford will be completed by developers who are building a housing estate. This is partially completed and hopefully will be finished by the end of the year. The other 'missing link' is at the Wakefield end at Chantry bridge.



This latter link was promised as a part of a proposed development between Doncaster Road and the canal. The likelihood is that this will not be complete for many years and the cycle forum is anxious that, in the meantime, the route is not spoiled by an 'impassable' section at the Wakefield end of the route. We are therefore proposing that we organise a 'workgroup' weekend to lay a temporary path. The Council have agreed to provide the materials while the Cycle Forum would provide the labour.

There are also a few sections of the existing route that need a bit of repair, so we will be contacting the Canal and River Trust to gain

agreement that our workgroup can work on these.

Workgroup Report

Our workgroup continues to meet on a regular basis, usually twice a month. They are at present building a new path through the woodland on the Nostell Estate just off the Doncaster Road.



The group has already shifted a few tons of bricks from the local brickyard as hardcore, around ten tons of surfacing material provided by the Council and only have about fifteen tons to go. If you think you can help let us know at info@cycling-wakefield.org.uk



Putting up the Barriers


In our newsletter in September 2010 we reported on a successful campaign to open an access point to Anglers Country Park on the north side of the lake, which previously required cyclists to dismount and lift their bikes over a horse step-over. The report in the newsletter suggested:

Now that the access is open, after nearly 2 years of campaigning by the WDCF, life is easier for cyclists but also for wheelchair and pushchair users. It took a long time, but we got there in the end'



Cyclist know that barriers can be annoying to some of them but to other they are debarring. The new strategy seemed to signal a recognition of this throughout the council

So it came as a great surprise when in March this year a kissing-gate appeared at this entrance (right). Council staff informed us that this was to be accompanied by a horse stepover, returning us to the pre-2010 situation. To add insult to injury the council officers involved had failed to inform or consult with the Cycle Forum. At our AGM we passed a motion opposing the new barriers and wrote to the Chief Executive asking that the project should stop. Unfortunately, once again without consultation, the project was continued.



In 2013 we were also successful in getting the Council to recognise, in its Cycle Strategy that 'barriers which exclude motorcyclists also exclude many cyclists, most wheelchair users and many others. The Council will attempt to minimise the level of restriction'





The kissing-gate was then removed. Your editor was told by the contractors that a new, bigger one would be installed next to the newly installed horse step-over (left). As one of the workmen remarked 'what a waste of money'.

The reason being given for the new barriers is the intrusion into the Country Park of motorcyclists. Different officers have given different tales to different members of the Cycle Forum, but it seems the instances of such intrusion is rare, some at night when no one else is about (traces of motorbike tyres have been spotted). It is remarkable that no

Cycle Forum members have ever reported sightings of motorbikes given the popularity amongst the cycling community of Anglers Country Park.

We will be meeting with the council officers soon, but it would help our campaign if cyclists, and others, made their feelings known to the council.

I am writing regarding the installation of barriers at the North entrance to the lake at Anglers Country Park, Wintersett. As a cyclist I wish to register my protest at this action.

One of the positive policies of Wakefield Council over recent years has been the removal of barriers which deter cyclists and other user and the installation of more appropriate barriers, e.g. bollards, on new paths. As a regular user of the cycle routes that run through Anglers Country Park I am appalled at this reversal of policy.

Not only will these barriers be a disincentive to cyclists, but they will I am sure debar many cyclists with non-standard bikes and other potential users with mobility aids.

The funds used to install these barriers might better have been used to improve the paths round the lake, which remain the worst on the local path network.

I urge the council to reconsider this action and remove the barriers immediately.
