Your chance to help medical research painlessly

Claire Wicks is a PhD researcher at the University of Essex and wishes to invite members to participate in some research that she is conducting. Her research investigates the relationship between participation in green exercise (physical activity whilst in the presence of elements of nature *like cycling*) and depressive symptoms in the UK general population. This research is important to understand if green exercise can be used as a healthcare intervention for people with depressive symptoms.

Participation in this research involves completion of an online survey *in the comfort of your own home (or pub)* which takes approximately 20 minutes. The survey asks some questions about the participant, the type of physical activity they like to do and why, and about how they have been feeling recently. The survey is completed anonymously and participants will not be asked for any information that may identify them. All responses will be kept confidential and stored securely. This research has been reviewed and received ethical approval from the University of Essex ethics committee. Further information is available at the link below.

News Roundup

Café at Anglers

The Woodland Café opened at Anglers Country Park at the end of July after several months when riders had only the limited facilities of a refreshment van and an ice-cream van. The premises look very smart, the staff are helpful and the food looks good. Contrary to rumours, they do sell fried or scrambled eggs, and bacon.



Feedback from WDCF customers so far is very positive, although I've yet to receive any reviews of the cake!

Ride Leaders' Training

An enthusiastic group of 8 attended our Ride Leader's Training Course on the 7th September at Nostell Priory, ably led by Ken Woodhouse of Pedal Ready Cycle Training. The morning talk was accompanied by a useful set of handouts and a quiz to ensure that lessons had been learnt. It was followed by a tasty and generous sandwich lunch, with a variety of cakes for pudding.

Groaning under their new weight disadvantage, trainees then set off towards Anglers, taking it in turns to lead what turned out to be a very unlucky ride. Despite the morning's lesson on checking bikes before setting off, mysteriously chains fell off, riders fell off and tyres punctured, creating new hazards for each prospective ride leader to deal with. Contrary to expectations, all got back safely.

Finally, participants were asked to complete a schedule showing which rides they would be prepared to lead or back mark. Details have been passed on to our ride coordinator, so you may see some new faces (or should that be backs) at the front.

Messages worth repeating

Cancellations

Occasionally, rides have to be cancelled at short notice, perhaps due to extreme weather or the sudden unavailability of ride leaders. We do try and send some-one to the start of the route to let riders know but strongly recommend that you **check on Facebook before you set off**, particularly if you are travelling a long distance. It may be lovely and sunny where you live, while a ferocious rainstorm lashes Nostell.

Castleford Mill

At present there is limited free parking at Castleford Mill for rides starting there, which generally take place on the second and fourth Saturday of the month. Please do not park in front of the Café, shop or other businesses on the site, all of which would welcome your custom.



Adult Cycle Training

Cityconnect is funded by the West Yorkshire Combined Authorities and works to help adults get back on their bikes and build their cycling confidence.

Whether you're looking to build your confidence, maintain your bike or master your commute, they have a course for you.

Free cycle training and maintenance courses for anyone 16+, from beginner to advanced including route planning and journey accompaniment, are FREE of charge. Participants can take advantage of up to 3 cycling sessions per level. Training takes place at one of the City Connect Cycle Hubs located across West Yorkshire, including Thornes Park in Wakefield.

Sessions are typically run in 2-hour blocks, usually with ratios of 1 instructor to 4 participants with cycle training and 1 to 7 with maintenance sessions. Bespoke and 1:1 sessions available on request. People in receipt of certain benefits may be eligible for a free bike.

Booking is required for these sessions

Throughout the summer holidays, WDCF has hosted 'Holiday Wednesdays' at Nostell Priory. Children have borrowed bikes and helmets to be led on a short route through the Priory's grounds or to try our renown cycling skills course.



Members did sterling work setting up the course, assembling the array of bikes and helmets and ensuring these fitted the young riders. Our crop of balance bikes meant that even the youngest could join in. The course was manned by marshals to ensure no-one went the



wrong way round the roundabout or forgot to sound the hooter to stop the timer. Meanwhile other volunteers manned the information stand to hand out leaflets, sign up new members and raise funds with the tombola stall.

Children and adults also had the opportunity to try a different type of bike.

WDCF had stalls at the galas held in Crofton, Featherstone and Havercroft, in a variety of weathers. Although the same facilities were offered at all three, skills course, information and tombola, variations in the space available meant that some ingenuity was required in setting up the skills course. At one venue we had two roundabouts and the paths crossed, so we had the additional task of avoiding collisions if the respective speeds of consecutive riders had been miscalculated. Nevertheless, a great time was had by all.



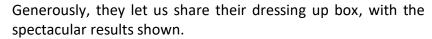
We signed up new members, sold some cycle bells, raised some money and generally spread the message that cycling is fun and should be accessible to all.

Turnip for the books

The rape crop has been harvested and the path across the field at the edge of Anglers Country Park, which featured in our last newsletter, is more or less accessible.

An unidentifiable (at least by the writer) root crop has been sown and, although the plants are getting bigger week by week, they are unlikely to present the same accessibility problems as the rape.

The path has not been reinstated or resurfaced yet and not wide enough for two bikes, or a biker and a walker, to pass so mangled wurzels are anticipated in due course.





There have, unfortunately, been developments since the above was written. The root vegetables have disappeared as the farmer ploughed the field on the 22nd October and the path has been obliterated.

The Public Rights of Way Department at Wakefield MDC has already been informed and we await developments
